

2023 Impact Report



Dear Friend of Collier Resource Center,

Thanks to your support, each year Collier Resource Center (CRC) expands our capacity to serve those in need, and 2023 was no exception. We hit another record high: **1,611 clients received assistance** and support, **a 39.6% increase** over the previous year! Since our inception in 2016, we have helped **over 5,500 people.**

The following are a few highlights from 2023:

- Of the 1,611 clients we served in 2023, **35% were 60+ years of age.**
- We dedicated energy and time to enhanced outreach for **senior women transitioning out of homelessness.**
- Referrals to clients in need came from 82 different sources.
- **Cocktails for a Cause,** our first-ever fundraising event, was highly successful with over 100 people in attendance.
- Our 24 volunteers gave **1,921 hours**, the equivalent of five hours donated every day!
- We maintained a lean and efficient organization with **96% of all donations** going directly to client services.

What makes CRC's mission unique is the fact that our case management program **costs clients nothing**, has **no limit of time**, and includes **follow-up care**. As new needs arise, we address them. We could not offer these services without our supporters.



- Provided diapers for young families.






- Found a hospital bed, wheelchairs, scooters, and even a pressure cooker for health purposes, all within hours of the requests.

Exponential Growth





In 2023, we served 1,611 individuals and families, an increase of 39.6% over the previous year. As the need increases steadily each year, so does our response.




Expenses




Volunteers are vital to our mission. Trained volunteers assist professional staff by locating and linking clients to community resources. Volunteers are essential in networking with local organizations and updating our resource directory to ensure referral information is current.

Our volunteer force currently consists of 24 individuals who gave 1,921 hours in 2023, valued at over \$50,000. The volunteers have diverse experiences, backgrounds and education, but all are devoted to improving the quality of life for our clients.
